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Overview of HOP



SUCCESSES

Pantry location & entrance

The process for clients to receive food was fast and efficient. Cars could easily drive around the building to have items loaded into their car and had minimal waiting time to receive their items, if any.

Canned and dried fruits, vegetables, and lean protein

A wide variety of dried and canned lean proteins was available to clients. Most canned vegetables were "low-sodium" or "no salt added" and all canned fruits were "low-sugar," "no sugar added," or "canned in own juice."

Staff attitudes

Police Jury staff distributing food were extremely friendly and kind to clients; they knew clients by name. Interactions between staff and clientele were very positive.

RECOMMENDATIONS

Pantry location & entrance

Having signage to indicate the distribution site location or entrance can help potential clients identify a much-needed source of food and help new clients more easily navigate the process of receiving food. Consider what signage could be added at your pantry to improve its visibility and navigability. If you are concerned that increased signage may increase the demand for food from community members, consider partnering with local grocery stores or other sources to augment donations.

Fresh fruits and vegetables availability

Local community and personal gardens, farmers, and farmers markets can donate extra bounty to charitable food sites. Collecting these garden or market donations can increase a site's availability of fresh produce for clients, reduce food waste, and connect the pantry with potential volunteers. Consider exploring possible partnerships with local growers to increase the healthy foods available for your clientele.

Pantry policies

To ensure that all clientele, especially those that may be at a higher risk for contracting foodborne illness, receive safe food, sites must follow proper food handling and storage practices. Staff and volunteers should be trained to follow all food safety policies and procedures. Consider holding food safety trainings and adopting a food pantry food safety policy to help guide pantry staff and volunteers' decision-making and ensure that foods your pantry is accepting, storing and distributing meet designated safety and quality standards.

Services for clients

Offering nutrition education classes can help improve clients' knowledge of nutrition and how to make healthy food choices to prevent diet-related diseases. Food demonstrations, taste tests, and resources like recipe cards can help to reinforce what clients learn in nutrition education lessons and show them how to create healthy meals from items they receive in their commodity boxes. Consider partnering with organizations to provide nutrition education classes, food demos, and other activities and resources to engage with clients and promote healthy eating.

NEXT STEPS

- Contact the LSU AgCenter Healthy Communities initiative to see if you may be eligible to receive funding and support for signage.
- Ask the LSU AgCenter Healthy Communities initiative about their Grow a Row to Share pilot program, which connects local producers with charitable food sites. You can also ask for assistance locating potential sources of donations or planning for accepting donations.
- Review the LSU AgCenter's <u>Safe Food Handling and Storage in Food Pantries</u> document. Contact
 the LSU AgCenter Healthy Communities initiative if you are interested in creating a food safety
 policy, holding food safety trainings, or would like more food safety resources.


East Carroll Parish Connectivity
