- Multi-dimension approach for centralization of programs









Medicaid Unwind

Unwinding the Medicaid Continuous Coverage Protection



- In response to the Covid-19 pandemic, in March 2020, Congress passed relief legislation that gave increased Medicaid federal funding to states. States were not allowed to terminate any member during the pandemic.
- By May 2023, total Medicaid enrollment was 2,055,359. 44% of Louisiana's population.
- Congress established the date of April 1, 2023 for resuming Medicaid renewals and terminations.
- Louisiana began terminating ineligible members July 1, 2023.
- Process will continue until July 2024.

Medicaid & LaCHIP

 Medicaid eligibility and qualifications





Qualifications for Medicaid:

- A low-income parent of children under age 19
- A child under age 19
- Pregnant
- Uninsured and need treatment for breast and/or cervical cancer
- A Louisiana citizen/resident aged 19 to 64 years old with a household income less than 138% of the federal poverty level

Other Qualifications for Medicaid:

- Receive Supplemental Security Income (SSI) from Social Security Administration (SSA)
- Receive Office of Family Support (OFS)-Family Independence Temporary Assistance Program (FITAP) financial assistance
- Disabled according to the Social Security Administration
- Visually impaired with corrected vision no better than 20/200

Medicaid & LaCHIP

- Every year, the income levels are adjusted for inflation
- Medicaid income levels increased in March 2024
- LaCHIP income levels are slightly higher





Louisiana's Medicaid is available to adults that income is up to 138% of Federal Poverty Level.



Health Equity & Social Justice Department

The Health Equity and Social Justice Department

- Frontline public health CHWs, ambassadors, "boots-on-the-ground"
- Trusted members of the community
- Serve as community liaisons/link between health/social services to facilitate access to services & improve the cultural of health
- Builds individual and community health knowledge & self-sufficiency
- Results met by-outreach, community education, informal counseling, social support and advocacy

CHWs ensure that those who are at-risk within their community receive health equity and social justice and do not get lost within a system.



Louisiana Community Empowerment Project

• Mission:

- Grassroots community-based model that utilizes trusted community organizations, such as barbershops, churches, and social influencers to provide education, resources, and outreach information.
- Through collaborating with local trusted gatekeepers, give the ability to spread appropriate, meaningful and trusted messaging and resources throughout the communities most impacted by health inequities and disparities.



LDH Medicaid Subcontract-14 months

- Outreach to members who not returned renewal forms
- Unreachable due to incorrect contact info

Community Empowerment Outreach Workers

- LDH Medicaid provided list for 29 parishes
- 35 outreach workers engaged






Medicaid Unwind Outreach

The Empowerment Team comprised of Coordinators, Community Health Workers, Outreach Workers, & Ambassadors are tasked with outreaching to Medicaid Individuals to insure they have their personal information updated with Medicaid. The goal is to make sure they keep their Medicaid coverage or assist them in getting Health Insurance.

 - Medicaid re-application
 - Completing renewal forms
 - Filing an appeal
 - Applying for a Marketplace plan if deemed Medicaid ineligible.





Navigators for a Healthy Louisiana

Navigators for a Healthy Louisiana* is a free non-profit federally funded program supported by a grant from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services Center for Medicare and Medicaid Services under the Affordable Care Act to assist Louisiana residents with access to low-cost or no cost health insurance options depending on their eligibility. Grant awarded to SWLAHEC and contractor CLAHEC.

Services provided:

- One-on-one assistance with applying, updating info and educating about health insurance options for Marketplace, Medicaid and LaCHIP
- How to utilize health coverage services & locate providers
- How to access preventable health services
- Language interpretations services
- Meeting times & locations convenient for patients & community members

Medicaid Wage Checks Now Every 3 Months

Important Medicaid Update: May Eligibility Wage Checks

Medicaid does an income check every three months to make sure members still qualify for Medicaid.

Letters will be mailed to members that need to verify their income to continue their coverage.



Prepare for Medicaid Eligibility Wage Checks



Update your information.

Include your name, mailing address, phone number and email as well as significant life changes. Life changes include marital status, family size or income level.



Check your mail.

When you receive a letter, follow the instructions in the letter so you don't risk losing your coverage.

Marketplace Plans

- Many are eligible for a low or no cost health insurance plan through the Marketplace.
- If no longer eligible for Medicaid, can apply for Marketplace by contacting a Navigator.



Health Insurance Marketplace

Federal Health Insurance Marketplace offers affordable <u>private</u> health insurance plans for U.S. citizens and persons legally in U.S.

Marketplace Health Plans offer:

- ✓ Comprehensive health insurance coverage and benefits
- √ Tax credits to help pay for monthly premiums
- √ Reductions in co-payments and deductibles
- ✓ Plan options with \$0 premiums if income is at or below 150% of the FPL (about \$21,870 for individual)*
- √ Federally subsidized paid premiums
- 4 out of 5 enrollees find a plan that cost less than \$10 a month

*Navigators can assist to see what residents qualify for.

When Can Residents Enroll in Marketplace?

- Special Enrollment Period (SEP)
 - Life changes or events qualification*
 - Losing health coverage
 - > No longer eligible for Medicaid
 - Moving
 - Getting married
 - Having a baby or adopting a child
 - Certain low-income level**



Annual Marketplace Open Enrollment Nov. 1st—Jan. 15th

Medicaid and LaCHIP can be applied for any time of the year.

*Note: Must apply within 60 days of change or event.

**Navigators can assist residents if they qualify.



How Do Navigators Make a Difference



A man came into the Baton Rouge Primary Collaborative Care, LLC clinic without any type of healthcare coverage and walked out having been qualified for Medicaid. He came in with a very sullen look but left out with a smile.

VOA of Southeast Louisiana referred a 60-year-old community member for Navigator assistance who had never had health insurance in his lifetime. He shared that he had never had physical, been able to get medication or had any preventive services. He was concerned about his health and wanted help. The Navigator assisted him with applying for Medicaid and also educated him about coverage to care services. He now has health insurance and can get preventive care which he is so grateful for.





Navigator was able to assist a mother who spoke no English with enrolling her baby into Medicaid. The language line was utilized, and the process was very positive for the mom.

CMS Marketplace Assister Community (MAC)

Center for Medicaid Services Marketplace Assister Community (MAC)

- CMS secure platform for consumers whose Medicaid/CHIP coverage has been terminated
- Consumer information shared with trained Navigators to conduct direct outreach through the MAC software platform

Overview: MAC Direct Assister-to-Consumer Outreach

- **Began:** May 2023 upon unwind initiation
- Focus/Target: Consumers who were terminated from Medicaid/CHIP due to Medicaid unwinding redetermination process
- Implementation: Navigator referrals via secure electronic account transfer from CMS & LDH Medicaid/CHIP for direct individual outreach
- Results: Outreached to 44,000 terminated Medicaid for direct Navigator-to-Consumer assistance

3-Prong Multi-Disciplinary Outreach Approach

- **69%** of current Medicaid recipients able to maintain their current Medicaid coverage.
- **646,629** residents, Medicaid & Marketplace members, educated & assisted

- Lower uninsured rate
- Increased access to healthcare

Outreach & Provide Enrollment Assistance

31% of previous insured Medicaid recipients potentially without insurance coverage to obtain coverage

Create a Proactive Implementation Statewide System of Reach

 Offer & extend SWLAHEC's muti-disciplinary outreach approach to Medicaid Insurance providers, hospitals, and clinics who identify a decline in patients with Medicaid or have uninsured patients to connect to affordable insurance options.
